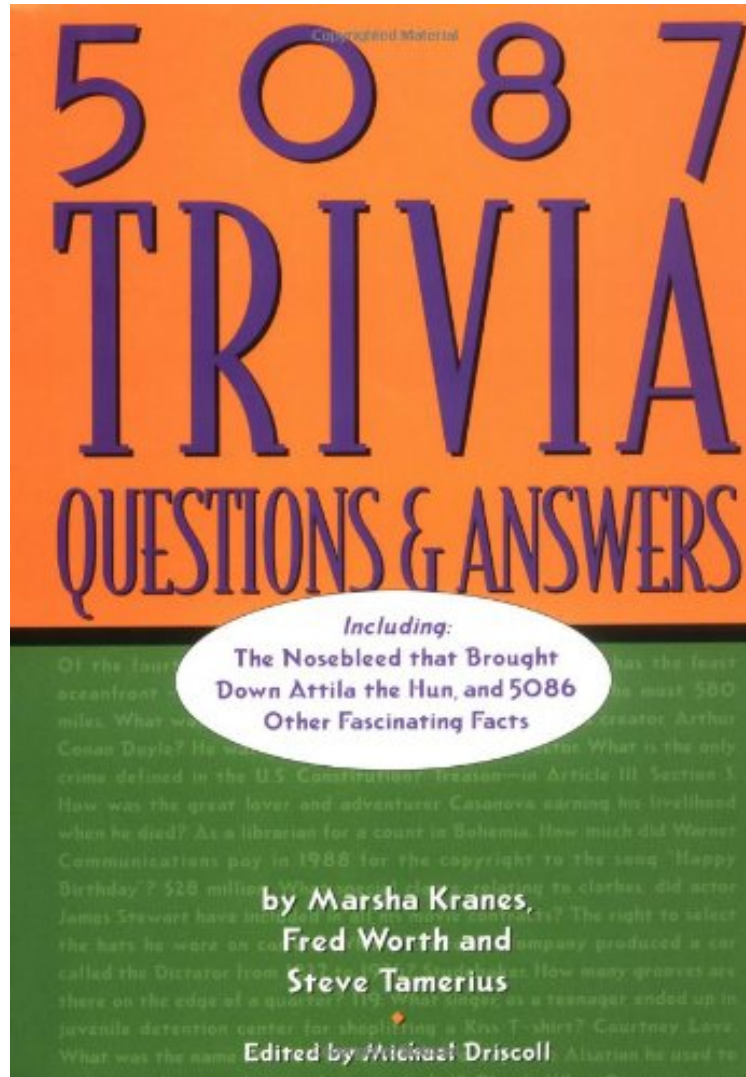

Kenyon Trivia and quiz buffs will find much to satisfy them here. You can discover which was the first car to have airconditioning or how many rooms there are at Buckingham palace. There's a good deal of original material, too, which has not found its way into the general literature. But buyers need to be aware there is a strong US bias in many of the sections. Last reprinted in 1998, there is not much material specifically relevant to the last ten years or so. This gives some of the chapters a dated look, for example on the cinema or TV. Inevitably there are some moot points. The original sources, for instance, are not unanimous that Attila the Hun died of a nose bleed (he may have been murdered).
